Dale attempted to mount our dog Mya 3 times. She did not appreciate his efforts and let him know. He never tried again. There were no other issues.</p> <p>Zoey thought the dogs would be fine together, as long as they weren't left unsupervised. They rode home in our jeep with no problems. They spent the entire afternoon with us in our backyard. They appeared completely neutral, as if they did not even notice one another.</p> <p>Several hours later, I gave Dale a squeaky ball. I thought it would be safe, as our dogs have zero interest in balls or squeaky toys. Dale enjoyed the ball while our dogs ignored him.</p> <p>Our dog Mya found a stuffed bear in the yard. Dale tried to take the bear and a fight ensued. He bit Mya on her back and then the back of her neck.</p> <p>Dale did not shake his head while biting. He was motionless... But he also did not want to let go. I tried spraying the dogs with a hose but had no water pressure. When Dale opened his mouth, I was able to pull him (by his harness) off of Mya and into our house.</p> <p>The entire incident lasted approximately one minute. Dale did not draw blood. However, Dale's previous injuries were bleeding. (his severed ear and punctured face)</p> <p>In hindsight, I felt it was a case of trigger stacking. It was too early to introduce toys --> Dale was worked up over the squeaky ball --> And he experienced severe pain when he crashed into Mya (due to his sensitive open wounds.) I regret not taking things slower and I'm truly sorry.</p> <p>From that point on, we kept the dogs separate. Dale could see our dogs through glass, but did not appear interested nor bothered.</p>	No

On Thursday, I was playing ball with Dale on and off throughout the day. At one point, as I leaned down to pick up the ball, he jumped and mouthed my neck. It did not hurt or break the skin. I really felt like he was just excited. We continued playing ball with no more incidents.

Later that night, while playing ball again, Dale jumped and mouthed my chin/lip. In the moment I was not worried for my safety, because I've witnessed dogs on the adoption floor (like Junior) do the same thing, and with much greater intensity.

Going forward, I decided to put Dale in a sit-stay each time before throwing the ball. This worked well and there was not another jumping/mouthing incident.

On Friday, I planned to talk to Danielle and Jen about what happened. I was not scared. I just wanted to know how to properly address this behavior in the future. We were very busy on the adoption floor and I got side-tracked doing numerous shows. So at the end of my shift, I talked to Andrea.

Andrea seemed seriously concerned, which gave me pause. She instructed me not to play ball with Dale again, until I could talk to Danielle. I followed her advice.

The next afternoon while looking for Danielle, Jen found me. She had heard about what happened. We discussed the situation. She expressed it was best for me to return Dale to the shelter (for the sake of my personal safety.) She explained that if Dale was dangerous, his behavior could escalate quickly.

I was shocked, and I had never felt afraid of Dale. But staff has much more wisdom about dog behavior than we do, so we returned Dale that evening.

While Dale was in our care, we spoonfed him every meal. He sat nicely for each bite. He showed no possession over his food. He was so submissive and docile every time we put on and took off his inflatable cloud collar. We felt safe enough to let him sleep in our bed. If staff hadn't become alarmed, we would gladly still have him right now.

But again, we are not animal behavior experts and we would hate for Dale to hurt someone. We don't know if he is dangerous or not. All we can do is share our experience and let you decide. We respect your judgement and support whatever decision you reach.

I asked more questions and she told me that recently (not sure exactly when) she had been playing ball with him - he would drop the ball in front of her and she would throw it. At one point when she went to pick up the ball, Dale jumped up and grabbed her throat with his mouth. He did not fully bite down and did not break skin or hurt her, but it scared her. She also mentioned that he had done that with her chin (grab it with his mouth but not fully bite down), not sure if it was at the same time as the throat bite. I told her that she should not play with toys with him at all and to do as minimal handling as possible for tonight and to speak with our Canine Care Specialist first thing tomorrow when she came in. She also gave me more details about the previous incident with her dog and it seems like it took [redacted] a long time to break up the fight (she was able to run into the house and across the yard multiple times trying to get things to help break them apart), and she said multiple times that once Dale had her dog in his mouth, he refused to let go. This dog does not have a tongue. A small portion of tissue that resembles a tongue is still present, but it is very small, far back in the mouth and not functional. The circumstances for its absence are unknown, but it has been absent for a long period of time and the dog has already adapted.

Without a tongue, he uses an adapted method of eating. Once he has food in his mouth, he tosses his head back to get the food into his throat. He will need food in a form that is easy for him to toss in his mouth and does not require a tongue to lick up. While at MCAS, he has been fed by shaping canned food into meatballs, which is a method that has worked well for him. However, an adopter can experiment with different methods to find what works best for him at home.

He is also not able to drink water normally, though he is able to drink on his own. Instead of lapping up water normally, he puts his face in a water bowl and sucks it up instead. An adopter will need to provide water that he can easily drink in this style.

Visualization of this portion was difficult, due to its location in the back of the mouth.
 Heart and Lungs: Ausc normally
 Abdomen: Soft, non-distended
 Musculoskeletal: Appropriate muscling
 Coat and Skin: Multiple scars and areas of scabbing on the face, body and limbs. The left side of the face appeared swollen, but I was unable to find any obvious wounds or pockets. Patchy alopecia of the caudodorsum, with areas of abraded skin and purulent discharge. No draining wounds seen. Blue coloring seen on the fur around the head and neck.
 Urogenital: Intact male, both testicles descended and palpated normally
 Lymph nodes: Left submandibular enlargement

EKT applied to both ears. Pinna wound was cleaned thoroughly with dilute chlorhexidine. The edges were debrided and necrotic tissue removed. Tied suture loops with 0 monocryl to 3 sides of the head, surrounding the ear wound. Applied SSD and a telfa pad to the pinna, then applied laparotomy sponges on top to provide stability. Attached the dressing to the sutured loops.

Gave Antisedan 0.2 ml IM. Gave Buprenorphine 3.0 (0.3 mg/ml) ml IV for pain. Gave SQ LRS 750 mls. Uneventful recovery.

Plan: Bandage change in 2 days (earlier if needed). Sedation may be required to replace the bandage, due to a painful ear. There is no tissue to close, so amputation of the remaining pinna may be necessary if the tissue does not heal. Pinna amputation may have to wait until the infection is under control. Placed e-collar.

Due to the lack of a tongue, eating and drinking may be difficult. No evidence the absent tongue is acute and he's in good body condition, so dog has been adapting well. Emailed Animal Care so they're aware of his situation. We'll start with soft food meatballs, since he may be able to apprehend and swallow those easier, but kibble may work for him as well. May need to be hand-fed if he can't eat on his own. His method of drinking is unknown at this time. He may be getting enough water in wet food, but any increase in requirement (such as with exercise or warm weather) may cause dehydration. He may also be able to suck up the water from the bowl instead, but this has not been witnessed. Animal Care will monitor his eating and drinking habits and experiment with different methods. Starting daily SQ fluids until we know that he can drink normally.

If an owner comes forward, an NOI should be issued. Photos were taken of the remaining portion of tongue and the necrotic left pinna.

Transfer from DoveLewis. Found as a stray with a large wound on the left pinna. Blue discoloration seen on surrounding fur. DL sedated to clean and bandage the wound.

Brief exam performed on intake. Complete exam will be performed tomorrow. Weight = 68.5 lbs, 31.1 kg. Head bandage had slipped onto the neck and was no longer covering the ear. Gauze was covering the left ear which could not be removed without sedation (stuck on the ear and caused pain when I tried removing it). Unable to see the ear wound, due to the gauze. Patchy alopecia of the caudodorsum and hindlimbs. Ambulatory x 4, no lameness. Ate cheese when offered, but did appear to have difficulty with apprehension. Dog appeared comfortable and stable.
